#### In Memory of a True Ambassador for Sister Cities.


Arthur served as the National Treasurer for the previous iteration of SCA, the Australia Sister Cities Association as it was back then, from 1991 until he stepped down in 2001. SCA would like to acknowledge the huge commitment and support he gave to the Association, not only during his time in office, but also during his long association with sister cities in Bankstown and Port Stephens. Following is a fitting tribute from his friends and colleagues (thanks to Ted Tindall for these words):

### ARTHUR HEILER – a lifetime of achievement.

It is with great sorrow we advise of the sudden passing of Arthur on 10th October 2018, aged 79 years.

He was a man with a lot of energy and determination, always willing to step up and achieve positive outcomes. In all his community activities he was kind, inspirational & a friend to all around him.

Arthur was a member of Bankstown Sister Cities for around 30 years & national treasurer of the then Australian Sister Cities Association before moving to Port Stephens where he was a member &



secretary of Port Stephens Sister Cities Committee for 24 years. He was a long term active member & divisional commander for 2 years of Port Stephens Marine Rescue, chair for 20 years of a local parks & reserves committee and director & deputy chairman of Fingal Bay Sports Club.

Arthur was actively involved when Port Stephens hosted the Sister Cities national convention in 1998 and when the Pacific Rim yachting championships were held there in 2000 - home hosting almost 100 crew and supporters from: Bellingham, USA; Victoria, Canada; Tateyama, Japan; Tauranga, New Zealand & Nahodka, Russia (all sister or friendship cities) sharing a week of yachting, cultural & social activities.

Arthur will be sadly missed but not forgotten by his many friends.

- 3) Host the SCA Annual Conference, each yeas SCA seeks a member city to host the annual conference, including the AGM. SCA will provide whatever support it can to help ensure the total success of the conference.

- 4) Have a Display at the Annual Conference, the opportunity exists at the annual conference to have a display stand to allow you to showcase the achievements of your sister city relationship. Share them with others and enjoy stimulating conversations about those achievements and how they came about.
- 5) **Enter the National Awards,** only SCA member cities are eligible to enter the National Awards, which recognise excellence in sister city programs and relationships, your chance to highlight your city, your programs and your people.
- 6) Participate on SCA's Executive, be a voice on the Executive to determine the role of SCA and the future direction of the organisation. SCA is a member organisation and needs to have proper representation and input from volumes.
- 7) **Voting Rights at the AGM,** only members are eligible to vote on any motions at the AGM.

8) **Networking with Other Cities,** SCA is able to provide direct one-to-one contacts or bring together groups at events such as State based forums. Networking is the ideal way to share

ideas, exchange information, make people aware of pitfalls and how to avoid them, and to even start new relationships.

### THE 2018 SCA AGM AND FORUM Held in Blacktown, NSW, on October 16<sup>th</sup>

The SCA President, Mr Bill Wilson, and the Executive joined with members of our association and other guests in Blacktown, NSW, for the 2108 SCA Annual General Meeting.

Blacktown arranged a spectacular dinner event the evening before where SCA presented the 2018 Awards to the winners, and the entertainment showcased a variety of talent from the Blacktown community. It was great to mix with so many of the local people who had contributed so much to a very successful Sister Cities program.

The proceedings for the Forum/AGM commenced at 9:00am with welcomes from the Blacktown deputy mayor, Cr. Tony Bleasdale, and the SCA President, Mr Bill Wilson. During the Forum we heard a keynote address from Dr Jim Taggert OAM, two engaging case studies from Blacktown, and then two presentations from long time supporters of

SCA, CLAIR (Japan Local Government Centre) and the Korean Local Government Centre.

The actual AGM commenced at 12:40pm. Following the formalities the President made an announcement that due to his long standing

support for sister cities, engaging as a member of the SCA Executive, and for driving sister city programs forward – Peter Filmer was to



be made a life member of SCA. This decision was ratified previously by the Executive and endorsed by those present at the AGM. The AGM was closed by Bill at 1:05pm.

Comprehensive notes streamlining the process, Important Dates, Information and Category Criteria are detailed in the 2019 SCA Handbook, which will be emailed to SCA member cities in the

New Year. **Important date - Eligibility Period:** 1 April 2018 to 31 March 2019

#### Categories are:

- **Community Involvement**: A project that demonstrates the widest possible community participation involving cultural differences or sporting activities between sister cities during the relevant period.
- Youth Project: a significant youth project that encouraged and stimulated youth participation in the local sister cities program. The project may include any number of activities including sporting, cultural, educational and fundraising projects.
- **New Affiliation**: This award is presented in recognition of new affiliations either completed

- or well under way during the period under review.
- **Tourism and Trade**: This award is presented for an imaginative project that furthers the development of tourism and trade between sister cities whilst at the same time promoting the ideals of people-to-people contact during the eligible period.
- Overall Program: The "Overall Program Award" is presented to the member that has been able to demonstrate continuity of activity, citizen and community involvement at all levels and shown imagination in a wide range of projects and activities.

### 10-year Perth-Seocho Friendship Anniversary



In 2008 the City of Perth established a Charter of Mutual Friendship with Seocho, Republic of Korea to facilitate mutually beneficial opportunities for both cities. This year the Perth and Seocho celebrate the 10-year Anniversary of our friendship.

In recognition of this milestone Anniversary Mrs Eun-Hee Cho, Mayor of Seocho and a delegation from the Seocho Government travelled to Perth across the 14-16 November to take part in anniversary celebrations and meet with Perth stakeholders.

Despite a short programme the delegation, with the assistance of the International Engagement Team, were able to pack in a great number of activities, the first being a meeting with the Chair Commissioner of the City of Perth followed by a Civic Reception, in honour of the Anniversary. The reception was well attended and provided opportunity for representatives involved in Perth-Korea trade, local Korean community organisations, Korean-language academics and students, amongst many others to engage with the Seocho delegation.

The program also provided opportunity for the Mayor and delegation to participate in discussions with local stakeholders such as the Perth Material Recovery Facility in South Guildford, the Planning and Transport Research Centre at the University of Western Australia and our very own City of Perth Library.

Additionally, the program also allowed the delegation to experience firsthand some of the City's great tourist icons including: Kings' Park; the Bell Tower; the Art Gallery of Western Australia; as well as locations further afield such as Cottesloe Beach and Little Creatures Brewery.

The delegation's experience in Perth was very well received and demonstrated the goodwill and opportunity that is shared between Perth and Seocho.

One of the highlights of the trip was going to school. Myself and two other student from our group attended Komono Jnr High for 3 days. As it was a junior high school there was only years 7-9. Two students attended Mizaho for three days. Whilst at school we met so many awesome people and made so many memories. The best parts of going to school in Japan was getting involved in English classes. Our group helped the kids improve their English as well as with their classroom work.



We luckily also attended their Culture Festival which only happens once a year. We also experienced the whole school come together to compete in singing on a Saturday! The competition was Class Vs Class, Year Vs Year and Teachers Vs Students. It was a very interesting to be able to be a part of it.

Another unforgettable day on our exchange was when we visited some hot springs. We started the day by eating at a traditional restaurant we had Japanese curry, soup, tempura or shaved ice after the meal we were very full and it was so delicious. The hot springs were a bit like a day spa in the mountains with several little pools that were around 40 degrees. There was such variety from an indoor and outdoor, single person jet back massagers, a stand up spa even a lap pool. Here

we experienced our first Onsen which is a traditional bath house.

Another day on our trip we were taken to a Ninja Village, a place I will never forget! Here learnt the ancient art of being a Ninja. We dressed as ninjas crawled through secret tunnels, walls and hid. We had so much fun trying and failing at each of the different obstacles. By the end of the day we all had earnt our very own Ninja licence. This really was an amazing day!

One of the biggest highlights of the trip was an overnight stay in Hiroshima. We headed there by Hiroshima bullet train ride it took about 2.5 hours. We visited the museum dedicated to World War two and the Atomic Bomb, This museum was eve opening as showed the before and after effects of the Atomic bomb



the lifelong struggles war especially the Atomic Bomb has caused. It gave a real feeling to what we have learnt in History at school in Australia. Close to the museum there is the Peace Memorial dedicated to the children effected by the war. People who visit from all over the world make paper cranes a symbol of peace and leave them there. Our goal was to make 200 paper cranes we ended up making just over 250 paper cranes which we left at the memorial. While at Hiroshima we walked through the peace park and also A dome where the Atomic bomb exploded. Hiroshima was



something that none of us will ever forget and reinforced to us the need for friendships to unite the world and peace.
