

The people of Bathurst showed tremendous support through donations to their Sister City Appeal and continue to extend a hand where ever they can. To date, they have raised over \$70 000 which has been put towards kindergarten facilities and provisions of food.

The community attended a ceremony at the Bathurst Japanese Gardens to commemorate the tragic event on

Sunday 11 March. The service included a one minute silence for all those who lost their lives as a result of the earthquake.

Distinctive images captured by Cairns artists and showcasing Australian culture have been the centrepiece of a Sister City photographic exhibition in the United States.


CAIRNS CONTRIBUTES TO 'ORIGINATION'

Members of the Cairns Photographic Society contributed to the Sister City exhibition Origination held in Scottsdale, USA, April 14 and 15. The aim of the exhibition was to highlight native cultures and will be held annually with a focus on

the native culture of the host region (American Indians from the Southwest) and the native culture of the 'Discovery Region'. This year the Discovery Region was
