This may also be held true for the relationships we hold between communities. How precious they are in providing so much to all those involved, whether it be in a minor or major role, they are all so important.

SCA has undergone severe restrictions since the advent of Corona and it appears this is going to continue for quite some time. Looking at infection figures from around the world it is quite apparent that we will need to adapt to live

with this virus and not be fooled in to thinking we will defeat it. This will continue to have severe impacts on our relationships and it is going to require adaptation to meet the current restrictions and to this end we are looking to host a Zoom Forum in the New Year in which we will have presentations from a number of communities who are meeting the challenge. WHAT SCA PLANS TO ACHIEVE IN 2022*

* Perth Japan Festival

Each year in the City of Perth there is a Japan Festival that celebrates all things Japanese. Along with traditional food vendors, there are a number of stalls that sell items such as kimono, yukata, Japanese groceries, toys, books and many other items. During the Festival there are also many performances of Japanese culture such as Taiko drumming, dance, kendo, aikido, singing and J-Pop.

SCA, in 2022, is seeking to have a stall that will celebrate the 12 sister city relationships that exist between local councils and their Japanese partners. The stall is also going to celebrate the sister state relationship that exists between WA and the Hyogo Prefecture, which celebrated its 40 year anniversary in June, 2021.

Participation from a number of the 12 WA councils will allow SCA to provide leaflets, flyers and information brochures highlighting the sister cities and to share this with the people of Perth and WA.

The Perth Japan Festival is scheduled to be held on March 26, 2022 and if previous festivals are any guide many thousands of people will be attending this free event. SCA is excited to be a part of this wonderful experience and sharing the benefits that sister city relationships can bring to the community.

* A Positive Outlook

The past two years have been hard for everyone, and for a people-to-people organisation it has been hard to maintain our contact with our members and friends as often as we would have liked. This has been especially true with almost no face-to-face contact in this time.

Looking forward into 2022 our crystal ball is predicting a much more positive outlook. With the imminent opening of local, national and international borders it is not beyond the realms of possibility that SCA could hold a face-to-face Forum or Conference somewhere in Australia next year. A number of cities have expressed a desire, should conditions prove favourable, to host an event in 2022 which would see us gathering once again with our friends from across the country and overseas.

The SCA Executive will keep you appraised of developments as appropriate and we look forward to being able to share our journeys, stories and highlights in the very near future.

* SCA On-Line Forum

We are in the early stages of planning an on-line Forum where we hope to have several councils share their sister city journey over the past two years. Innovation has been the key to taking relationships forward during these times of difficult communication, and some councils around Australia have done this remarkably well. This will be an opportunity to hear their stories, ask a few questions, and

maybe gather some neat ideas to include in your future programs.

Once the program and presenters have been finalised and a date agreed, we will be sending out details of the session and on how to register for the one hour Zoom event. Your Executive look forward to having you join us.

* SCA National Awards

SCA has not held its National Awards for the past two years, but we are going to be resuming competition in 2022. The one major change will be the eligibility period for the Awards. Traditionally this has been for a 12 month period but next year we will be making it for the 18 month

period from 1 October 2020 to 31 march 2022 – there will also (for this year only) be a special Category 6 – Special Program Award to cover from 1 April 2019 to 30 September 2020. This will allow member councils to showcase any activity during those time periods and to

* Membership Subscriptions

SCA has not charged any membership fees since 2019 and all members that were current on June 30, 2020 have automatically been rolled over. Unfortunately our finances can't handle having no income forever and it was decided at the last AGM that membership fees would be reinstated from the end of this financial year.

The membership fees will remain the same as they were in 2019 and the Treasurer will be contacting all members in early June, 2022 with an invoice detailing fees and payment options. Given that Australia is predicted to begin opening soon then we are more than hopeful that you will be able to receive great on-going value for your membership of your association.

* RMIT Research Project

The Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT) has, over the last few years, been conducting research that investigates the links between sister city relationships and other benefits to local government and communities. SCA has fully supported these research projects and RMIT are currently preparing a new project, the details of which are below.

SPECIAL ARTICLE FROM GLADSTONE

Saiki Shorebird Artwork


On 4 September 2021, the Gladstone Region and Saiki City celebrated the 25th anniversary of the signing of the declaration of friendship between the two cities. To commemorate this milestone, three stainless steel shorebird artworks have been installed at the entrance of the Gladstone Regional Council Civic Centre.

The three stainless-steel bird shapes created by Margaret Worthington and Clive Rouse, represent three shorebird species that are seen in the Gladstone Harbour. A Bartailed Godwit, Far Eastern Curlew and Grey-tailed Tattler are identified by their beak shape in this contemporary work. Shorebirds are used to symbolise how people of Australia and Japan are connected by this amazing migration.

During our summer upwards of two million shorebirds arrive in Australia from the Northern Hemisphere where they breed. The birds start to arrive from late August onwards and can frequently be seen feeding in the coastal, tidal areas of the Gladstone Harbour. The adult shorebirds leave in March-April the following year, often flying up to 30,000kms on their return journeys.

Recent satellite tracking shows a flight path connection between Queensland, Australia and Kyushu, Japan. The tracking shows the birds flying 7,000km nonstop in 6 days to make landfall in Japan, before spending time in South Korea and then the breeding grounds of Alaska, an incredible 13,000km journey!
