A FEW WORDS FROM OUR NEW EXECUTIVE MEMBER



Welcome to the latest edition of the Sister Cities Australia Newsletter. My name is Greg McCallum and very pleased to have been appointed as an Executive Board Member of Sister Cities Australia. I am the International Links & Sister Cities Co-ordinator at Blacktown Council in Western Sydney — one of the largest local government authorities in Australia.

My working background has been varied. Initially a primary school teacher, I refereed Rugby League and was fortunate to be offered a position of Referees Director in the United Kingdom where I worked and lived for 7 years. It was during that period that I experienced a variety of communities — culturally, educationally and of course sporting in places all over Europe. It was this life change that sparked my interest in how people and communities exist and can interact for the positive benefit of all.

Blacktown has a population of 403,000 people, being the largest Council in New South Wales. We have people from 188 different birthplaces. Top 5 countries of origin include Philippines, India, New Zealand, Fiji and England and 182 languages spoken. Blacktown is a diverse City in every regard.

As International Links & Sister Cities Co-ordinator, I oversee a long standing, energetic and wide- ranging program. Blacktown has formal Sister Cities with Porirua (NZ), Su-Seong Gu (South Korea), Liverpool Plains (Northern NSW), Liaocheng (China) and with the League of Cities (Philippines). Our program is strongly supported by the Mayor and Councillors who see strong cultural, sporting and educational links and opportunities

important to the City, particularly for the youth who will be the future community leaders.

A solid business and economic program operates alongside the Sister Cities activities. In recent years a Mayoral led delegation of small business operators travelled to Su-Seong Gu in South Korea and was able to have open access to business there due to the excellent relationships and protocols developed over 28 years of the Sister Cities agreement. More recently with a focus on International Links a similar business delegation travelled to India and forged strong business connections.

Our relationships closer to home are equally important with opportunities for our young people travelling for events in Quirindi and other towns within Liverpool Plains Shire. Our strong Maori and South Pacific community ensures our Sister City in Porirua New Zealand is always foremost in important events such as Waitangi Day and The Matariki Festival.

Whilst the recent Covid-19 Pandemic had significant impact on our activities and in-coming delegations we have continued to maintain contact and are now well and truly looking ahead to re-invigorate our activities with educational groups, sporting and cultural. Post Pandemic all countries and communities around the world are in similar stages of recovery. Resilience and determination to re-connect must be foremost in our approach. Hopefully the reliance on technology to communicate throughout the Pandemic will sit alongside face to face activities and the outcome will be strong Sister Cities relationships and programs moving forward.

I look forward to meeting as many people involved in the many wonderful International Links and Sister Cities programs around Australia as we emerge undaunted and strong.



* SCA National Awards

SCA had not held its National Awards for the past two years, with the competition being resumed in 2022. The one major change for this year only is the eligibility periods for the Awards. Traditionally this had been for a 12 month period but this year we will be making it for the 18 month period from 1 October 2020 to 31 March 2022. There will also (for this year only) be a special Category 6 – Special Program Award to cover from 1 April 2019 to 30 September 2020. This will allow member councils to showcase any activity during those time periods and to

highlight the great work done by councils, the volunteers, and the community in furthering the aims of sister cities.

Our SCA members have until July 15 to get their entries in for judging and for their chance to be recognised with an SCA National Award. It is hoped that SCA will be able to present the winners with their trophies at a function later in the year — stay tuned for details as they become available. Good luck to all the entrants!

* Membership Subscriptions

This is just a gentle reminder that SCA has not charged any membership fees since 2019 and all members that were current on June 30, 2020 have automatically been rolled over. Unfortunately our finances can't handle having no income forever and it was decided at the last AGM that membership fees would be reinstated from the end of this financial year.

The membership fees will remain the same as they were in 2019 and the Treasurer will be contacting all members in early July, 2022, with an invoice detailing fees and payment options. EXTRA SPECIAL ARTICLE FROM CHRISTCHURCH, NZ

New international game plan for Christchurch



Australia, the West Coast of the United States, the Guangdong Province of China and the Republic of Korea will be the focus of 'Team Christchurch's' efforts to build stronger international ties.

These destinations have been selected by a group of organisations representing the city's business, trade, tourism and education sectors and the Sister Cities community because of the potential of these connections to the city.

"By focusing our collective efforts on building strong, beneficial relationships with these destinations we are confident that we can grow the city's economy and attract and develop the best talent and ideas to Christchurch," says Mayor Lianne Dalziel.

"We will still maintain the relationships that we have with our seven Sister Cities, but as we emerge from the earthquake rebuild and the COVID-19 pandemic, we want to maximise our economic recovery and reassert our place as place as New Zealand's second city through more deliberate and targeted international engagement," says Mayor Lianne Dalziel.

"On the advice of a group representing organisations with significant international interests, the Council has agreed that 'Team Christchurch' should focus its collective efforts on building connections within the Guangdong Province of China, the West Coast of the United States and the Republic of Korea. These will be known as our 'City-wide Focus Partnerships'.

"We want to seek to deepen our existing relationships within these destinations through new direct air links, increased business connections and international exports that will help grow our local economy.

"We also want to explore opportunities to collaborate on issues that we have in common, such as how we adapt to climate change and build resilience. We want to share knowledge, attract talent and ideas, and open up opportunities for our residents," the Mayor says.

On the group's recommendation, the Council has also designated Australia as a 'Foundation and Recovery Partner'. This is recognition of the special importance of the trans-Tasman relationship.

"Australia and Australians have always been greatly important to, and valued by, our city. This will be especially the case as ChristchurchNZ, Christchurch International Airport and others work to maximise our city's COVID -19 recovery in the near to mid-term, while

we await the opening of our borders to other countries," the Mayor says.

The organisations who advised the Council on which international destinations to target are all founding members of the International Relations Policy Framework. They include ChristchurchNZ, Ngāi Tahu, the city's tertiary institutions, Education New Zealand, the Canterbury Employers' Chamber of Commerce, Christchurch International Airport Limited and Lyttelton Port Company, The Asia New Zealand Foundation, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, the Christchurch Foundation and New Zealand Trade and Enterprise.

Saiki Shorebird Artwork - UPDATE!

On 4 September 2021, the Gladstone Region and Saiki City celebrated the 25th anniversary of the signing of the declaration of friendship between the

two cities. To commemorate this milestone, three stainless steel shorebird artworks have been installed at the entrance of the Gladstone Regional Council Civic Centre.

On Thursday 17th March, the unique Saiki Shorebird Artwork was unveiled at the Gladstone Civic Centre to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the signing of declaration of friendship between the Gladstone Region and Saiki City.

The occasion commenced with the Art and Science of Shorebirds Workshop, where Birdlife Capricornia Secretary Allan Briggs shared his insight and knowledge into the amazing migration of the shorebirds with participants from the community, while artist Margaret Worthington led an art workshop where the attendees had the opportunity to practice drawing the shorebirds and then create a watercolour painting.
